Black Producers

Acreage up 14% since 2017; nearly one-fifth served or had served in the military



In 2022, the United States had 46,738 producers who identified as Black, either alone or in combination with another race. They accounted for 1.4% of the country's 3.4 million producers, and they lived and farmed primarily in east Texas and the Southeastern and Mid-Atlantic states. Black producers were older and more likely to have served or to be serving in the military than U.S. producers overall. Their farms were smaller, both in average acres operated and average sales of agricultural products.

Number and Location

In 2022, the ag census counted 46,738 Black producers involved in decision making for 32,653 U.S. farms. The number of Black producers decreased 4% from 2017. The number of Blackoperated farms declined 8% between 2017 and 2022. Black producers operated 5,323,654 acres, up 14% from 2017.

In Texas, with more Black producers than any other state, Black producers accounted for 3% of the state's total producers. States with the highest percentage of Black producers as a share of total producers included Mississippi (12%), Louisiana (7%), South Carolina (7%), Alabama (6%), and Georgia (4%).



Producer Characteristics

Black producers were on average older than U.S. producers overall (60.8 versus 58.1 years in 2022) and more likely to have served or be serving in the U.S. military. A larger share were male (69% versus 64% for all U.S. producers).

A smaller share lived on their farm (60% compared with 70% for all U.S. producers).



Farm Characteristics

Black-operated farms sold \$2.8 billion in agricultural products in 2022, with 56% (\$1.6 billion) in crop sales and 44% (\$1.2 billion) in sales of livestock and livestock products. These farms accounted for 0.5% of total U.S. agriculture sales. They received \$78 million in government payments in 2022.

Fifty-five percent of Black-operated farms had sales and government payments of less than \$5,000 per year, compared to 41% of all farms; 12% had sales and government payments of \$50,000 or more, compared with 27% of all farms.

Farms and Land

Black-operated farms accounted for 5.3 million acres of farmland, 0.6% of the U.S. total. The majority of Black-operated farms (84%), like all U.S. farms (70%), had fewer than 180 acres. The average size of Black-operated farms was 163 acres.

Seventy percent of Black-operated farms were operated by farmers who own all the land they operate, 22% by farmers who were part owners (own some land and rent some land), and 8% by farmers who rent all land operated.

Nearly half (45%) of Black-operated farms specialized in cattle and dairy production in 2022, almost all in beef cattle production.
